Rob Schiller recommends:

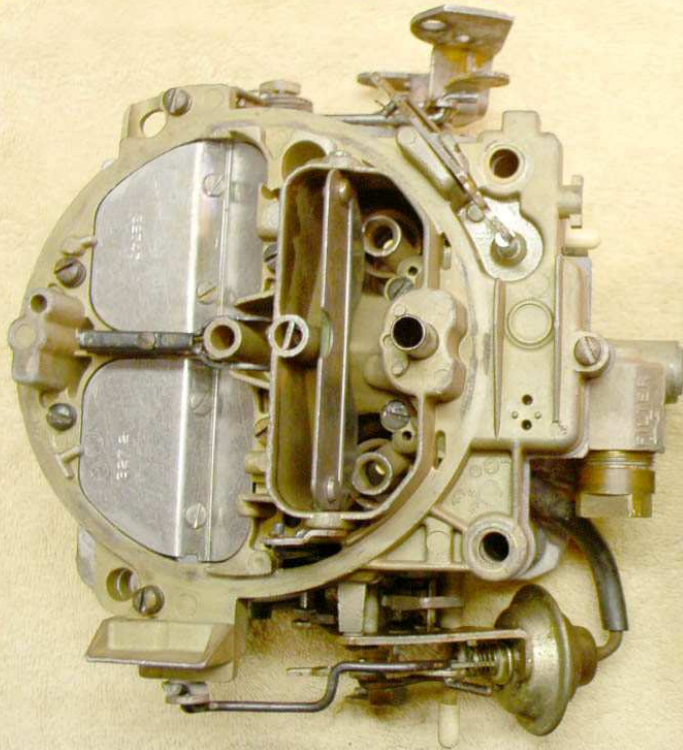

Morland writes:

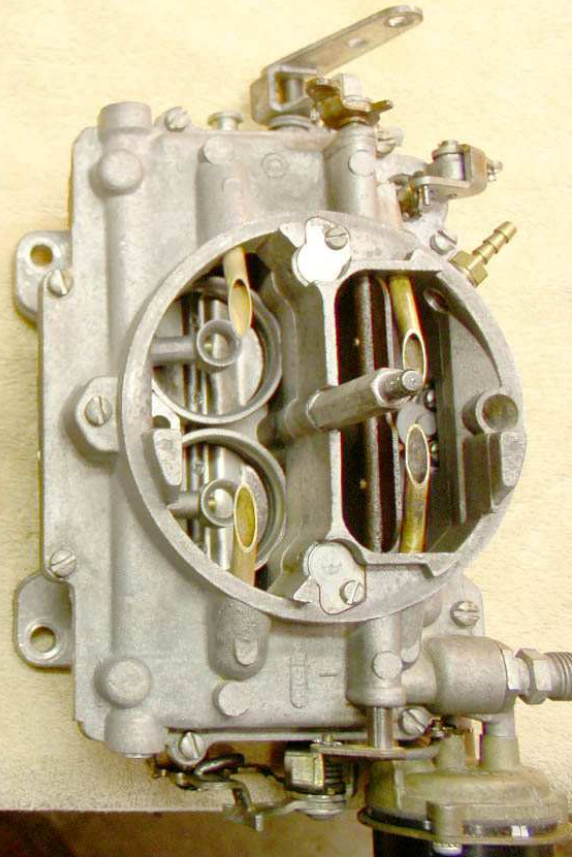
These are good, trouble free carbs that have given good service over the years. A couple of caveats however -- Some of their models have torx screws, so you need torx drivers to work on these. Most of the Rochesters have a double flat spot on the idle screws, so you'll need a special tool for idle adjustment, available at most good auto parts stores.

I'm posting a couple of pictures, one showing the comparison between a Carter and Rochester, and one showing Rochester screws that tend to loosen up over time and should be checked periodically to preclude any fuel leaks.
