58' Commander Sport Fisherman History By Dick Avery 2002

Preparing for our recent move I discovered these old Chris Craft drawings. They had been stored for over 20 years, and some were too damaged to save. The rest, along with pictures of some of the boats that I had designed, I donated to the Chris Craft Commander Club at the Spring Meet in Bradenton, FL, 2002 for the benefit of the club.

This book is the presentation I made to Genth & Murray, and was approved by them. The boat is 58' Commander Sport Fisherman.

While working on a design for a 58' Flush Deck Motor Yacht that dealers had requested, Dick Genth and Dale Murray went to the Bahama's to see the Bertram – Hatteras "Shoot Out" fishing tournament. When they returned, they told me to forget the Motor Yacht and design a 58' Sport Fisherman instead. They wanted two boats produced. They liked the designs I proposed and asked how long it would take to build them. I replied that since only two were to be produced, a mold could be made instead of a plug, the way we usually built production molds. Engineering made shop drawings for the molds, and we lined the frames with gloss Formica and wax for the best possible finish. When we started laying he parts, Genth & Murray began looking for engines for their boats.

Genth drove Murray nuts by telling him he was getting some super fast Diesels for his boat. He wouldn't tell Murray what they were, so Murray fired Genth. We went on to finish the first boat for Murray. It turned out beautifully. I don't know if they built the second boat, but Genth did not get his. This story is possibly a big part of why Murray Chris Craft went out of business.

Some of the stories I was told at time of purchase could be completely inaccurate. The one thing that everyone seems to agree on is that the boat I bought, HUNTER, was Dale Murrays boat. The broker that has the listing for SEA YA, the sister ship that was being built for Genth has represented the last two owners and has the history and records back to 2006. I did read the story about the engines but after talking to Bob Schwarz, the current listing broker, I found out that Genths boat was built with the same

turbo charged and super charged 12V92 Detroit 1080 HP engines as the HUNTER. It was repowered with Cat C18 engines in 2006




#11B & #11C - 58' Commander Sport Fisherman proposal.




#11D – Layout of 58' Commander Sport Fisherman.


















